Hello FCC Family!

Spring is so close, however, Lent is here! Since I gave you a short history of St. Valentine last month, it would only be appropriate for me to tell you another history of a pertinent saint who is identified with the month of March. You may have heard of him. His birth name was Maewyn Succat but you know him better as St. Patrick.

Much of what is known about his life comes from the Confessio, a book Patrick wrote during his last years. Born in Great Britain, probably in Scotland (wait, he's not Irish?!), to a well-to-do Christian family of Roman citizenship, Patrick was captured and enslaved at age 16 by Irish raiders. For the next six years, he worked as a herder in Ireland, developing a deepening religious faith. At 22, he escaped back to Britain and was reunited with his family.

While back in Britain, Patrick had a dream in which he heard voices of Irishmen pleading him to return to their country. After being ordained as a bishop, Patrick the people of Ireland with everything he had. returned to Ireland in 433 at the age of 37 and began preaching the Gospel, converting many thousands of Irish and building churches around the country. After 40 years of living in poverty, teaching, traveling and working tirelessly, Patrick died on March 17, 461 in Saul, where he had built his first church.

He was made the patron saint of Ireland and baptized thousands of Irishmen into the Christian faith. He used a Your Pastor & friend, three-leaf clover (shamrock) to describe the Holy Trinity. These days, March 17 is a day of international Rev. TJ Long, Jr., Minister celebration, as millions of people around the globe put on First Christian Church their best green clothing (even though Patrick commonly of Elizabeth City wore blue) to drink libations, watch parades and toast the minister@fccec.org luck of the Irish.

Many of the holidays that we celebrate in America have ties to the Christian faith but many of the details have gotten lost over the decades and centuries. The purpose of St. Patrick's Day is to commemorate a man who returned to country where he was imprisoned as a child to give people liberty from their sin by introducing the gospel and Jesus Christ. In contrast, the purpose seems to wear green, "be merry" and not get pinched.

This loss of purpose doesn't just happen with holidays but within every one of our lives. It's easy to forget what our purpose is in this life. It's not to make money, raise kids or even to pursue happiness. Our purpose, the whole reason we were created, is to worship God and serve humanity. Perhaps you can think of it like a campsite; to "leave the world a better place than you found it." The only way to do that is to be selfless, others-focused like St. Patrick was. He could've held a grudge or let bygones be bygones but he obediently followed God's leading to his life's purpose. He devoted his life to God and served

Let us be thankful and inspired of the REAL St. Patrick (who routinely wore blue and was not Irish) by considering our real purpose and finding ways to serve others and

leave this world a better place than we found it. I'd love to partner with you in doing just that.



FEBRUARY 2024 BOARD REPORT

The official board of First Christian Church met in the Fellowship Classroom on February 5, 2024, at 7:00 P.M. Tom Sawyer, moderator, called the meeting to order and led us in the Lord's Prayer. Our pastor and 15 board members were present. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Portia Copeland, treasurer, provided the January check register as well as account balances as of January 31, 2024.

After lengthy discussion, we decided to task ourselves with finding suggestions to address his concerns and bring them back to the committee on February 11th. Some of the topics were congregational singing, sleeping during the sermon, and lack of engagement by the congregation. We adjourned with a hard job ahead. 



NEW BUSINESS: Paula Crawford brought up a concern about how much cold air comes into the building when those using the door between the Fellowship Classroom and the Youth Room fail to close it completely. There followed a discussion about problems with other doors needing work.

Paula also shared a concern about the women's bathroom in the Fellowship Hall needing to be more handicapped accessible. Some suggestions were made as to additions that could be helpful for safety in the bathrooms.

The moderator offered a suggestion that to be inclusive, any church committee communications through e-mails should include all committee members.

Tom Sawyer stated that Northeast Academy for Aerospace and Advanced Technologies would like to rent the gym in the spring. He requested, and was given, approval to speak with Ms. Chappell, Dean of students, about possible dates.

MINISTER'S REPORT: This report covers things accomplished in the month of January. I made 12 pastoral visits this past month.

The new plexiglass backboards will be installed by Dunavant's Steel of Camden by Friday, February 23rd. NEAAAT's coaches are excited about the upgrade. The backboards will be ready for Open Gym on the 26th.

Our Bible Discussion group is currently reading through the books of 2 Kings, Psalms and Isaiah with an average of six in attendance each Wednesday.

I met with Joy & Melodi on the fourth to help facilitate a smooth transition from one Outreach chair to another. The Outreach Committee met on the 30th and will be offering a Parent's Night Out (which gives parents an opportunity to drop off their kids at the church for two hours on a Friday for a date night, while the kids have a movie night with snacks here in the fellowship hall all for free), which will happen on Friday, March 23rd from 6-8pm. Outreach also has other plans for this year that will be presented next month.

I assisted a handful of volunteers in undecorating and cleaning the sanctuary and hallway on the 12th and continued that cleaning trend by having eight volunteers gather the next day for a Community Cleanup. We were able to clean over 400 pounds of trash from seven streets surrounding the church. Green Saves Green, a local non-profit, provided us with all the grabbers, gloves, safety vests, buckets and bags we needed at no cost!

That following Monday, on the 15th, Daniel Spence (the pastor of Victory Praise & Worship Center) and I took 13 underprivileged middle and high school students to their first ever professional basketball game in Washington, DC. All the kids were well behaved and were super appreciative for the opportunity.

I attended a Worship Committee meeting on the 21st and our first district meeting of the year in Williamston on the 23rd. We will be hosting the next district meeting in April.

Lastly, I was asked by the chancellor of ECSU to be one of three pastors to speak at this year's ECSU Clergy luncheon, which happened on the 31st.

I've also been asked to preach on one of the Wednesdays of the Lenten series at Christ Episcopal Church. I will preach on March 6 at 12pm.

The next two months with the Super Bowl party, Ash Wednesday, Week of Compassion, Lent and Easter services coming up will prove to be a busy yet impactful time for us all.

Thank you for your support and I'm looking forward to February and celebrating Lent with you all.


